What is Camp Trinity Academy?

Camp Trinity Academy is a weeklong camp for boys who are considering the possibility of someday studying at seminary. It isn't only for those boys who know they want to go to seminary. Many of the boys who attend Camp Trinity Academy may very well end up taking a different path. Of course, the main purpose of this camp is to help the church, specifically local pastors and congregations, to raise up men to be pastors. However, we hope this camp will also promote future leaders in our congregations. We have been blessed with seminaries to prepare men for the office of Word and Sacrament established by our Lord Jesus. However, as much as the seminary professors, fieldwork and vicarage supervisors play a pivotal role in forming these pastors for the church, we cannot underestimate the impact of the local pastor. Camp Trinity Academy exists to foster this bond between potential seminary students and their local pastors. The following is an outline of the program.

Qualifications and Ages of Campers

Campers must be members of a confessional Lutheran congregation, either already confirmed or in his final year at Catechism/Confirmation Class. Ages will range from thirteen years of age or going into 8th Grade to eighteen years of age or having just graduated from high school.

Length of the week at Camp

Campers will arrive for registration at Camp Trinity, New Haven, MO on July 16th, 2023 between 5:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Campers will leave that Friday, July 21st at noon.

Curriculum

Campers will take courses covering three fields of study: Biblical Theology, Doctrinal/Confessional Theology, and Historical Theology. The particular subjects of each course is to be determined. Each class will be taught by a pastor. A fifth field of study, Practical Theology, will be covered in the evenings as a fireside chat where a pastor will discuss certain practical issues around a campfire. Also, during each day we will spend time in the library. Here campers will be introduced to the discipline of independent research.

This is where the local pastors are the most crucial. When a camper registers for Camp Trinity Academy, he will pick one field of interest from the first three fields of study (Biblical, Doctrinal, or Historical). He will work with his pastor to pick a specific topic in that field of study. In the months or weeks leading up to his stay at Camp Trinity, he will meet with his pastor to study this topic, his pastor providing whatever resources he determines are at the camper's level of comprehension. And he will discuss with his pastor one or more practical issues, which arise out of that field of study. When he arrives at Camp Trinity Academy, he will make use of the library time to dive deeper into what he has been studying with his pastor at home. The other classes he is taking that week will also help him grow in his understanding of his selected topic. If his pastor is not able to come to the camp with him another pastor in attendance can help the camper in this area. The following are some examples of how campers might prepare for camp with their home pastors:

- a. For example, a camper might pick Biblical Theology as his field of study. His topic of interest might be how Christ is taught in the Old Testament. His pastor should guide him to get more specific, such as how Christ is taught in the book of Genesis. His pastor can give him some resources to read as a way to deepen his understanding, such as excerpts of Luther's lectures on Genesis. Luther talks a lot about God's use of preaching through a human voice, for example. This brings up all sorts of practical issues, such as worship, meditation, suffering, prayer, etc.
- b. To give another example, a camper might pick Historical Theology as his field, and he is interested in the early church fathers. Again, the pastor should guide him to get more specific, picking a specific time period, a figure, or an event. Maybe he is interested in the Council of Nicea. Or perhaps he wants to read one of the Church Fathers. His pastor can provide resources for him on these things. He might read a chapter or two from one or two history books, such as Henry Chadwick's *The Early Church*. All sorts of practical issues come up when you read the sermons of the Fathers or the canons in the councils.
- c. To give one more example, a camper might pick Doctrinal/Confessional Theology as his field, and he is interested in the topic of the Lord's Supper. He can read the Augsburg Confession and Apology, articles 10 and 24, Luther's Smalcald Articles on the Mass and the Lord's Supper, or the Formula of Concord, article 7. This brings up all sorts of practical issues, such as church fellowship and closed communion, the use of the sacrament, sacrifice vs. sacrament, etc.

The idea is for campers to build on their topics of interest throughout the years. These topics of interest may shift, and this is good. We will not require papers to be written; however, we would be willing to help any camper move in that direction. Camp Trinity Academy will serve as a hub for beginner theologians to sharpen each other and study together, even as each studies under his home pastor.

Activities at the Camp

While the campers will be enriched in theological learning, there will be plenty of fun activities throughout each day, including canoeing, swimming, Chicago softball, and hiking.

Worship at the Camp

Every day will consist of Matins in the Morning and Compline at night. This will include the singing of hymns and Psalms. Part of training boys for potentially pursuing the ministry is having them participate in the daily offices as acolytes and lectors. These liturgical duties will be assigned to campers when they arrive.
